

**Riga House Registers Project**

Mid-Term Report  
(December 2010)

The goal of the project is to create the database of Latvian Jewish population resided in Riga before WWII upon the examination of House Registers stored at Latvian State Historical Archives and to combine families' data and establish according relationships thereafter. At the beginning of the research, the use of the early House Registers of 1920—1930-ies was considered as a priority: this was the time period when individuals from across the country had re-evacuated to Latvia after WWI; in most cases, returnees arrived to Riga first and after a short indeed registered stay moved to the other regions of Latvia. Accordingly, the Registers contain the data on natives of Latvia, not only Riga. Furthermore, this was the time period when a significant number of Latvian inhabitants permanently left the country and emigrates' data is hardly found at other preserved documents.

House Registers as a form of population registration represent the unique historical source. However, like any data source, the critical approach is required. The records of family names, maiden names, father's names, dates and places of birth, occupation and marital status are often inaccurate. It mainly concerns the data of house registers of early 1920-ies since the information for the records was provided verbally. E.g., the transliteration of last names into Latvian language for booking at a house register in some cases led to their misspelling; the use of both Julian and Gregorian calendars for birth dates might impact the data accordingly. The completeness of records in the house registers may vary, too.

By the first reporting period, 7000 individual names were added into the database (ref. the attachment). The work has been continued in accordance to the schedule and currently there are 12000 names stored in the database already and it is planned to reach the total of 14000 individual records by the period of annual reporting.

In Riga, house registers were reestablished on July 15th, 1920. Upon the decision of the Ministry of Internal Affairs of April 13th, 1923 and in accordance to the existing rules of citizens' accommodation and departure registration, the owners of the houses were obliged to keep a proper house register book compliant to the defined format and should have registered all house residents within 24 hours of appropriate accommodation or departure. These records then had to be applied immediately to the corresponding police department. At resident departure, the special remark should be made in the house register specifying the date and place of departure. Based upon the data of house register, the corresponding remark in citizen's passport was included. (Board Bulletin (Valdības Vēstnesis), 1923 № 76 (1923.11.04. № 907).

The presented database allows to establish kinships within the limits of the present documents' array and to follow up the accommodation and relocation of people to the period of occupation of Latvia in WW2 (1941).

Data sorting by family names allows identifying individuals with identical and similar last names. This, however, is not the main determinant for kinships, indeed provides a ground for further research and work completion.

In the above case, there is Limonik family of Moisey (Mozes) as the family head and his wife Natalia Limonnik, maiden name Markuse. The reference to the maiden name allows continuing the search by last name Markuse.

Data sorting by addresses allows spotting the range of citizens simultaneously accommodated at the same address. As a generic rule, relatives of the same family shared the same apartment. This particular case is considered in the table below.

This gives a new possibility to search and establish relationship within the representatives of 5 more families:

This is evident that Meier's wife was Lea, the daughter of Samuel DOLGITZER, born on April 1, 1884.

The next data sorting by the family name DOLGITZER and the address of Stabu 59-18 demonstrates the following data range:

Upon the analysis of available information it may be concluded that DOLGITZER family head was Schmuel / Sammel, the son of Leiba, born on December 5th, 1855 in Vitebsk. His wife indeed was DOLGITZER, born WEISBEIN, Nechama, born on September 3rd, 1861 in Beshinkovichi, Vitebsk province.

The search of information by the address of Stabu 59-18 leads to the assumption that the brother of Nechama was:

WEISBEIN Haim Moschus 1878 05 05 Riga Stabu 59-18 M Single

The examination of the birth records made by Riga Jewish community in 1878 may result in identification of the names of Haim's and probably Nechama's parents.

In conclusion, the information stated above demonstrates the approach of step-by-step examination of House Registers to combine the data and establish the related interpersonal links.
